PASTOR'S CORNER

I was driving through a parking lot the other day and noticed that Bed, Bath, and Beyond was closing. Apparently, they are going the way of Toys R Us, Blockbuster and Borders Books. Apparently, they have failed to change and adjust to the world. They are not alone. We, in general, avoid change. People cringe when they have to move from one city to another. Changing jobs is frightening. Changing habits is a pain in the proverbial backside. Change requires us to face the challenge of the unknown, or to go through a lot of work. Change brings us face to face with that which is not over that which we know.

The church has gone through changes over its history. Christianity, at its outset, was a faith in the minority. Its followers hid in shadows, meeting in houses in secret. They were often persecuted, tortured, and killed. Then, in 325, Constantine will make Christianity legal, and the religion of the empire.

As time has progressed, the church has gone through the schism, the reformation, and today the church is going through a different period. As the church in the United States continues to drop in attendance and membership, there are rampant questions about integrity, transparency, and even morality. All of these questions are leading to changes.

Pastors used to be, mostly, universally trusted. There is a window on my office door not just to protect the people I talk to, but also to protect me. With that window there, there is a safety measure that protects those I meet with and myself. There is no doubt that what takes place in my office is professional and appropriate. In days past, that window was not necessary or expected.

Some congregations are now worshipping on other days besides Sunday. Gatherings are taking place in a wide variety of venues that include homes, parks, bars, restaurants, schools, community centers, and more. Worship formats are in constant flux from traditional liturgies to unplanned sessions where it seems more like a party and less a formal worship service.

There is good news though. There is something that does not, and will never, change. The message of the love of God, and the call for us to love one another. While the format, the medium, and the practice of that message are and must change, the message is the same yesterday, today, and tomorrow.

I recently read that a couple of years ago, over 4,500 protestant churches closed in the United States. Another study showed that while less than half of the country was attending a worship service, well over 60% still believed in Jesus. And just for fun, still another study reported that less than 3 out of 10 people who do not belong to a church or denomination had been approached to hear the word of God or to be shown the love of Christ. Here is my conclusion. We, the church, have to change. We have to change how we live. We have to change how we deliver the message of God. We have to change how we embrace our neighbors. We have to open ourselves to the new life and the new way of being the church that God is offering us.

We can certainly not change if we so choose. However, if we don't change, we can be assured that the message of Jesus will be communicated to the world. God's word will never die. We can remain as we are in our communities, living and doing as we have for over a hundred years and more. Or, we can turn on the light, push away our fears, and grow closer to both Christ, and our neighbors. If we do not change, we will go the way of the dinosaur.

Friends, change is hard. Growing up from children into adulthood is hard. Graduating from school and taking on responsibility is hard. Raising children seems impossible sometimes. And yet, we do all these things, sometimes without even thinking or pausing. We can take comfort in Gods infinite love, while at the same time breaking out of our church building shell in order to grow God's Kingdom.

Friends, in a world full of fear and trepidation, let us step out with courage, generosity, and the will to be better, do more, and a desire to accomplish wonderful things. Amen.
