May is also, for many and most, the end of the school year. For some, they will be moving onto middle school, while others will be looking forward to high school. I know in my house specifically, and all across the nation, many will be facing college, jobs, and a whole new life.

I have been talking to some about how to prepare young people for college. Imagine if you will an experienced mother trying to explain childbirth to a first-time mother. (I know Carol Burnett once said it is like pulling your lower lip over your forehead.) Another analogy is a combat veteran explaining combat to a new recruit. These are things that simply must be experienced. (For the record, I have personally not experienced either thankfully.)

And do not forget the occasional advice. (It will be heard, and at some point, applied.)

While much of this seems to be aimed at the new college student, it can be applied to the new middle schooler or high schooler as well. (Graduate students are likely on their own by this point.) All these steps in growing up are challenging and frightening even if the young person does not admit it.

While May means a lot of graduations, it does not mean the end of relationships. Our communities, and our futures are stronger when we stay connected. I have personally known many a student who moved up and was left to their own devices. I have also known many with good friend and family connections. I can tell you the ones who were both more likely to succeed and find purpose in their daily lives as opposed to being overwhelmed to the point of giving up.

While you are at it though, do not forget to say some prayers for educators. The teachers and staff, at all levels, are tired. They have been challenged throughout the school year both inside the classrooms and in the public forum. They need our prayers and our help. Right with them is the parents. Raising young people truly does take a village, or a metropolis. Jesus says that whenever two or more are gathered in his name, he will be there. Well, we need Jesus, and we need strong, healthy, loving communities. Amen.



### MISSION AND OUTREACH


