I friends, October is here, and with, hopefully, some more comfortable temperatures. As I am sitting here thinking about October, I am pondering fall, the changing leaves, football, baseball, cooler weather, and Halloween.

Yes, I'm thinking about Halloween with candy, costumes, parties, and above all else, masks. These masks may be scarry, funny, silly, superheroes, cartoon characters, slipped on, painted on, or anything that hides the true identity of the wearer. But, has that not always been the real intent of a mask? The robber wears a mask so the police cannot peg him. The child wears a mask to enhance the game of imagination. The party goer wears a mask to have fun. Some masks have been intended to scare off evil spirits, while others are worn to attract. All masks hide something though.

Many people where a mask, and no one knows it. I am not talking about a Halloween mask, or a villain's mask. I am talking about the smile that hides the pain. I am referencing the face we make when we do not want anyone to know how we are hurting.

A youth might laugh at a joke while crying on the inside. It is the laugh of a heavy person at a proverbial fat joke. It is the laugh of a poor person who has worn out clothes while others mock her. It is the laugh of the ridiculed cancer patient with no hair, while others tease, perhaps even with well-meaning. It is the face we all put on for those we are not comfortable with. It hides who we really are.

So here is a question. Who can you take your mask off for? Who do you feel safe around? It may sound like an easy question. However, it is far more complicated than one might think.

I have been accused in life of being too honest. I have caught this caution both at work and at home. I have been told I reveal too much of who I am. And I know it has cost me and gotten me into trouble. Let that sink in for a moment. Honesty has actually gotten me into trouble. I have experienced problems for not wearing my mask.

We all have a need to let down our proverbial guard. We all need to breath, to cry, to scream, to unload our overwhelming burdens. We need more people that both know us, and accept us.

On the other side, each of us has the ability, the calling, to be a safe person. It is one of the truly Divine things that God has laid upon each of us. We can help heal people by simply listening, embracing, and even proactively drawing out the real in the person in front of us.

Halloween is a great time to wear a mask. However, we should be allowed to be who we are to the world without punishment, and each of us should also be a safe place where masks can be discarded. Sadness and pain need not be covered up, but instead healing should be the real answer, not a mask.

Let us all come to God, and to each other, just the way we are; broken and loved.

While I am at it, I want so to share something with you this month. It is a poem of sorts that we used to share at Houston Presbyterian Cursillo/Pilgrimage. It was impactful for me, and I hope it is for you also.

Please don't be fooled by me. Don't be fooled by the face I wear, for I wear a mask. I wear a thousand masks, masks that I'm afraid to take off and none of them are me. Pretending is an art that is second nature to me, but don't be fooled, for God's sake don't be fooled.

I give you the impression I'm secure and that all is sunny and unruffled with me, within as well as without, that confidence is my name, coolness my game, that water is calm and I'm in command and that I need no one, but don't believe me, please don't believe me.

My surface may be smooth, but my surface is a mask--my ever varying and ever concealing mask. Beneath it dwells the real confusion, fear and aloneness. Beneath lies my smugness, my complacently, but I hide this--I don't want anyone to know it.

I panic at the thought of my weakness and fear being exposed. That's why I frantically created a mask to hide behind-- nonchalant sophisticated facades to help me pretend-- to shield me from the glance that knows-- but such a glance is precisely my salvation, my only salvation and I know it. That is if it's followed by acceptance. If it's followed by love, it's the only thing that can liberate me from myself, from my own self built prison walls and from the barriers that I so painstakingly erect. It's the only thing that will assure me of what I cannot assure myself, that I'm really worth while, but I don't tell you this, I don't dare--I'm afraid to.

I'm afraid that your glance will not be followed by acceptance and love. I'm afraid you'll think less of me and you'll laugh and your laugh will kill me. I'm afraid that deep down, I'm nothing and that I'm just no good and that you'll see this and reject me.

So I play my game; my desperate pretending; with the facade of assurance without and a trembling child within. And so begins the parade of masks, the glittering, but empty parade of masks and my life becomes a front. I idle chatter to you in suave tones of surface talk. I tell you everything that's really nothing and nothing of what's everything and what's crying within me.

So when I'm through going through my routine, do not be fooled by what I'm saying. Please listen carefully and try to hear what I'm not saying--what I'd like to be able to say, but for survival I need to say, but what I can't say.

I dislike hiding, honestly, I dislike the superficial game I'm playing, the superficial phony game. I'd really like to be genuine, spontaneous and me, but you've got to help me, you've got to hold out your hand, even when it's the last thing I seem to want or need.

You can help wipe away from my eyes--the blank stare of grieving dead. You can help call me into aliveness each time you're kind, gentle and encouraging. Each time you try to understand because you really care, my heart begins to grow wings, very small wings, very feeble wings, but wings.

Ii you choose to, please choose to. You can help break down the wall behind which I tremble. You can encourage me to remove my mask. You can help release me from my shadowed world of panic and uncertainty. From my lonely prison.

So do not pass me by-- please don't pass me by. It will not be easy for you. A lone conviction of worthlessness builds strong walls. The nearer you approach me, the blinder I may strike back.

It's irrational, but despite what books say about man, I am irrational, I fight against the very things that I cry out for, but I am told love is stronger than strong walls. In this lies my hope, my only hope, please help beat down those walls with firm hands, but with gentle hands--for a child is very sensitive.

Who am I, you may wonder? I am someone you know very well. For I am every man and every woman you meet.
